You can also see how many times the class has been interrupted through children arriving late to school. Punctuality is extremely important for your child to be fully equipped with the whole days learning ahead of them.



### What is acceptable attendance?

Stradbroke School, The Local Authority and The Government all believe that each and every child should attend school and arrive on time for at least 96% of the time. The chart below shows that if you go on holiday for two weeks during term time your child's attendance will be below the expected attendance rate.

We are now checking attendance regularly as we already have 60+ children who are classed as being a persistent absentee. Make sure your child has no unauthorised absence.



DID YOU KNOW? A two week holiday in term time means that the highest attendance you can achieve is 94.7%



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## Useful Medical Information:

### Childhood Illnesses: **Chicken Pox**

Chicken Pox is common and mostly affects children, but you can get it at any age. It usually gets better by itself after 1 to 2 weeks without needing to see a GP.

An itchy, spotty rash is the main symptom of chickenpox. It can be anywhere on the body. Chickenpox happens in 3 stages. But new spots can appear while others are becoming blisters or forming a scab.

**Stage 1:** small spots appear anywhere on the body, they can spread or just stay in one area.

**Stage 2:** the spots fill with fluid and become blisters. The blisters are very itchy and may burst.

**Stage 3:** the blisters become scabs and are flaky while others become scabs

**Exclusion Period:** at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over.



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
